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## From the President



#### Welcome to 2025

The U3A Committee passes on its best wishes to all U3A members and families for a productive and enjoyable 2025. We look forward to your participation in one or more of the multitude of offerings of U3A in Canberra.

U3A enters 2025 in a position of strength with both membership and course offerings on the uptick after the uncertainty and restrictions of the

'intense' COVID period. We have also recently established strong external partnerships such as with the ANU School of Music.

Financially our strong position has enabled strategic investments to enhance members' experience by upgrading meeting rooms, new IT equipment and music instruments, and support for Tuesday Forum etc. The new Committee will focus on areas of potential investment to build the organization for the future and broaden its offerings. Member suggestions are most welcome.

The one constant item of feedback received across our Canberra membership, including in the 2024 members survey, is the value members place on social engagement. The opportunity provided by participating in U3A to catch up with friends over learning opportunities and share refreshments, be it a cup of tea or, for the Seminal Music Course at Yowani Golf Club, something stronger, are highly valued by members and underpin our success.

Whilst we currently have a number of courses/forums that run online, we don't anticipate a large increase in these as they do not offer the opportunities for social engagement that face-to-face sessions provide. However, they are popular where the format is one speaker to many and not a major focus on engagement. The courses offered by U3A Canberra are the main form of engagement and whilst our focus is around 'learning', it is interesting to observe that for many other U3As, there is a focus on 'recreational' activities such as museum visits, theatre nights, dining out, and pickleball.

A recent article in the Atlantic noted that many Americans are now spending more time than ever alone, and this changes personalities, politics, and even relationships to reality. Australia is not so different, and the rise of social media compounds these trends.

Supporting the value of social inclusion and strong external relationships is increasing governments' recognition of the role of continuing social engagement in maintaining the physical and mental well-being of its 'senior' population. Many governments are introducing programs to support 'active, healthy living and social inclusion'. The ACT has its Senior Grants Program to 'assist older Canberrans to participate in all aspects of city life, be it through work, volunteering, art, sport and or skills development'.

For the future, the Committee is focussing on strengthening the offerings and approaches of U3A that enhance community wellbeing for our membership cohort. Also, we need to ensure that in maximizing social inclusion U3A Canberra continues to promote an environment that encourages diversity, respect and inclusion.





### Art Workshops in Curtin

### **Tuesday Forums 2024: Report**

For the U3A Canberra Tuesday Forums, 2024 was a very successful year. There were over 30 well attended Zoom sessions with average attendance exceeding 100. Feedback on the topics and on the quality of the discussions was extremely positive. For a talk on the Middle East, 170 members zoomed in. Other popular forums included the ACT election, 2024 in review, politics in Australia, ACT Right to Die legislation, and elections in India and Indonesia.

Moving to Zoom has enabled us to attract interstate speakers, such as star guests Michael Kirby and Jenny Hocking, as well as many fantastic local community identities. It has reduced the administrative requirement on the two members who run the forums and significantly reduced the need for volunteers in an environment where it has been difficult to attract volunteers.

As well as members from U3A Canberra (over 500 pre-registered participants), the Forums attract welcome attendees from around 25 regional U3As, primarily in NSW. Talks are now recorded for those unable to catch them live.

In exciting news, the U3A Canberra Committee recently agreed to provide the annual funding for the operating costs of running the Tuesday Forums – Zoom costs and charity donations (to thank speakers) and possibly minor IT assistance. This decision was made in recognition of the 'broad benefit of the Forums across both U3A Canberra and regional U3As that, unlike courses, are not restricted to those who are course members.' The Forums are frequently cited as the 'premium' use of online facilities across the U3A network in Australia.

Another example of a successful online course has been 'Conversations' held on alternate Fridays via Zoom which attracts over 100 members drawn from both Canberra and regional NSW, with an average attendance of 30. The range of speakers has covered local community, art and culture, politics and current affairs.

Members unfamiliar with the technology have been assisted to set up Zoom so they can join in online offerings. We may expect to see a gradual increase in online offerings, potentially capitalising on those from other U3As, to meet an increase in membership interest in online courses where they complement traditional face to face offerings and are not a substitute. They are ideal for lecture-type talks where one speaker addresses many and social interaction is not a primary aim.

## A musical coup for Canberra Recorder players!



Sarah lives in Amsterdam, where she teaches and performs (she is a member of Royal Wind Music). She commutes to London where she is Professor of Recorder at the Royal College of Music. She is well known all over the world for her 'Team Recorder' videos on YouTube.

Our members were joined by recorder players from all over Eastern Australia and some local players. We assembled in the large hall of the Woden Seniors' Club for an afternoon of musical wonders. We were delighted with the choice of music from Purcell to modern film music, taught with Sarah's well-known skill, knowledge, enthusiasm and vibrant personality.

I enjoyed replacing my baton with my tenor recorder, and together we produced marvellous music. When we had packed our instruments away, we settled down to Sarah's solo recital. It was recorder playing by a rare virtuoso, and we were enthralled. Everyone who attended was absolutely delighted to have met her, had an afternoon of tuition, and heard her recital.

About thirty of us then adjourned to the nearby Hellenic Club for dinner and more socialising. This was, indeed, a day to remember.

### Carol Flynn: Understanding your Superannuation

The Understanding your Superannuation U3A course runs twice a year from March and September.

As one 2024 participant said: 'Information about superannuation entitlements and rules is required knowledge for people our age if we want to have financially secure lives.'

These are reasons other participants attended:

- 'I felt paralysed around dealing with my superannuation, and I was hoping to simply gain a better understanding of what superannuation is and how it works.'
- 'I wanted to make sure that I understood Australia's superannuation system, rather than just think that I understood it.'
- 'I was hoping to better understand the relationship between my PSS pension and the additional Super Fund I joined after starting work following my retirement from the APS.'

For 2025, the first ten sequential session course will run from Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> March to 27<sup>th</sup> May 2025, and has 25 vacancies. The content is comprehensive and gives participants the knowledge and skills to *'make the most of it for your own situation'*. The topics covered fall under four headings:

- 1. What is Superannuation and how does it work? Where do you fit in?
  - a. Why understand your Superannuation?
  - b. The way superannuation works
  - c. The superannuation industry
- 2. The rules of Superannuation: what you can and cannot do
  - a. The two stages of your superannuation and the rules
  - b. Superannuation retirement income streams and more complex rules
- 3. Understand your Financial Adviser, their ways of working and their recommendations
  - a. Basic investment principles and risk/returns. Your risk profile
  - b. Talking to your Financial Adviser
- 4. Retirement income streams and your retirement journey
  - a. Your retirement income streams
  - b. Planning your retirement journey.
  - c. Your Will and your superannuation (Lawyer)

The course is available in person in Room 1 at the Flynn Community Hub and live on Zoom on Tuesday mornings, from 18<sup>th</sup> March 2025. This is to allow Northsiders, and particularly U3A members from Gungahlin, to attend closer to home, although everyone is welcome, and we usually have some interstate participants. Some participants only attend in person and some only on Zoom; many choose which best suits them week by week.

'So glad Zoom was an option when work meant I couldn't attend in person' and 'So handy to be able to join by Zoom and I never felt I was missing out'.

A recording available to enrolled participants was well used:

'I loved being able to watch each session again' and 'Worked very well – delivered quickly after the session, clear audio, advantage of increasing/decreasing speed.'

Overall, the course is rated as excellent, comments include: 'Excellent pedagogy' and 'You presented a superb course on personal investment in relation to retirement and superannuation.'

He will also guide you on how to get it printed and get it to your readers. You can just come along to hear about the process, or you can immediately start preparing your book.



In the last year alone, he has edited and designed three history books. Two were heavily illustrated organisational histories – coming in at 220 and 440 pages. Both were released late last year. Another was a 48-page book on historical walking trails in Canberra. And already in 2025 he has completed writing, editing and designing a new 240-page history book which will be launched in February!


Throughout the term David invites guest presenters to show and tell how they do what they do, including in the very first session. This includes authors, printers and recently published U3A authors that attended this course in 2021 or 2024. The printers also usually offer a tour of their printing establishment which has proven very popular – and is optional in week 11!

You can just bring along a note pad, your ideas and your project if you have one. You might like to purchase David's new edition of *The Design Manual* (at 25% discount for you – so only \$60 instead of \$79 RRP), but it is not essential. There will be handouts provided weekly.
